

IMPROVING READING SKILLS USING ON-LINE NEWSPAPERS AND MAGAZINES**ZLEPŠOVANIE ČITATELSKÝCH ZRUČNOSTÍ
PROSTREDNÍCTVOM ON-LINE NOVÍN A ČASOPISOV***ZUZANA HRDLIČKOVÁ***Abstract**

One of the basic skills Business English students need to develop is understanding the news. Reading business texts enables the learner to improve reading skills and to learn essential vocabulary. Additionally, it allows him/her to keep up with national or international economic developments. The paper is part of the Project KEGA carried out at the Faculty of Applied Languages of the University of Economics in Bratislava. It aims to demonstrate challenging, individual work of an experimental group of students of the Faculty of National Economy using LMS Moodle over one semester. Via a quantitative analysis a corpus of business texts from English-language newspapers and magazines will be built. A qualitative analysis will reveal the readers' preference in chosen topics.

Keywords: *text, reading skills, business vocabulary, technology.*

Abstrakt

Jednou zo základných zručností, ktorú si študenti v rámci obchodnej angličtiny potrebujú rozvíjať, je porozumenie správ. Čítanie odborných textov umožňuje čitateľovi zlepšovať svoje čitateľské zručnosti a osvojiť si potrebnú slovnú zásobu. Okrem toho mu umožňuje držať krok s ekonomickým rozvojom na národnej a medzinárodnej úrovni. Príspevok je súčasťou projektu KEGA realizovaného na Fakulte aplikovaných jazykov Ekonomickej univerzity v Bratislave. Jeho cieľom je ukázať podnetnú individuálnu prácu študentov experimentálnej skupiny Národohospodárskej fakulty s využitím LMS Moodle počas jedného semestra. Pomocou kvantitatívnej analýzy sa zostaví korpuz odborných textov z novin a časopisov v anglickom jazyku. Kvalitatívna analýza odhalí preferenciu čitateľov pri výbere tém.

Introduction

Six faculties of the University of Economics in Bratislava offer courses in Business English. First-year university students, who studied English as a first foreign language at secondary schools have acquired either a B1 or B2 language levels (CEFR), are mixed together and attend courses in Business English for advanced students. In seminars, *Market Leader Business English Course Book Upper Intermediate* (Cotton, Falvey, Kent, 2011) is used. The textbook presents twelve units and a typical unit consists of the following sections: Starting up, Vocabulary, Reading, Listening, Language review, Skills, and a Case study. Reading sections include interesting and relevant texts from *The Financial Times*, *Bloomberg Businessweek*, *The Telegraph*, *The Sunday Times*, *CBS*, and *The Corporate Knights*.

Most students put in a great deal of effort to pass written examinations. In order to help them attain an advanced level, as the syllabus states, the Department of English Language of the Faculty of Applied Languages launched the Project KEGA last year. So far, 301 students have participated in it. The summer term of 2018 was aimed at improving reading skills by working with authentic texts from prestigious newspapers and magazines. *The Guardian*, *Forbes*, *Newsweek*, and *The Economic Times* have online versions that are the same editions as the

printed copies available at the newsstand. The project also aims to show how learning in higher education can be enhanced by reading anytime and anywhere with the use of LMS Moodle.

Developing reading skills in a classroom

Many students of the University of Economics in Bratislava are partially employed by large multinational corporations or work in industries whose language is English. Apart from digesting large quantities of reading materials in English, they must read periodicals or newspapers so as to keep up with changes in their industry (Donna, 2000). They must have a rich business or specialized vocabulary to communicate successfully in English with their colleagues or managers.

Language learners acquire vocabulary through practice. There is a plethora of ELT materials for enlarging vocabulary and developing skills. Forsyth's (1996) resource book is focused on advanced-level listening and speaking skills. The pack offers a wide variety of topics through authentic reading and listening materials. By going through the reading tasks, vocabulary areas, and speaking tasks readers practise predicting text context, reading for details and overall gist, finding specific information, scanning for facts, answering closed and open-ended questions, and the like.

When developing business skills, Donna's (2000) suggestions can be followed. She deals with these skills: talking to clients, telephoning, dealing with visitors, talking to colleagues, reporting to foreign managers, participating at meetings, negotiating, note-taking, giving presentations, writing e-mails, report-writing, and understanding the news.

Taylor (2006) provides tips for improving Business English which are included in sections on networking, socialising, presentations, telephoning, negotiations, writing e-mails, meetings, reading business texts, listening, business vocabulary, and grammar.

In order to improve students' reading skills and prepare them for working with business texts individually, the following steps were practised in seminars. Having set a time limit, students were asked to skim an article for gist. When time was up, they were asked to summarize the text as far as possible. When they came up with a few ideas, we improvised some simple comprehension questions on the article which we thought they would be able to answer without difficulty. After inviting questions about vocabulary and allowing students another five minutes for reading, we continued with a few more detail questions. This is a realistic approach given that students will have limited time in real life and given the fact that the tasks reflect the real-life situations (i.e. reading through an article quickly, and checking a few words in a dictionary).

Using newspapers and magazines as learning tools

If the learners want to keep their English up to date and practise their reading skills, they should read a British or an American newspaper occasionally. Newspapers use modern vocabulary and expressions aimed at native speakers. According to Taylor (2006), readers should start by choosing one of the more serious papers such as *The Times*, *The Guardian*, *The Washington Post* or *The Sarasota Herald-Tribune*. Tabloid newspapers such as *The Sun* are filled with idioms, slang and national pop culture references which often make them more difficult to understand. Learners should also try one of these papers later.

Joyce (2003) believes that newspapers are a useful tool in the ELT classroom for improving reading skills. She encourages students to read newspapers outside the classroom because ongoing reading can help them discuss ideas more fluently as well as read and understand a whole variety of texts.

In Budden's (2008) view, learners should read the news. The four main media sources – TV, the Internet, newspaper/magazines and radio – give them opportunities to consider their advantages, to talk about the news and express their own opinions.

We believe individual work can also be quite ambitious. According to Nimritta (2016), Learning Management System (LMS) Moodle is an intuitive and supportive environment for the independent nature of learning in higher education. She states there is no population more technologically skilful than post-secondary students – the virtual landscape of LMS Moodle is one they are familiar with and can navigate through easily. Online learning platforms like LMS Moodle are ideal for students in higher education.

Research methodology

The research aims to show the work of an experimental group of students from the Faculty of National Economy participating in the Project KEGA. During the summer semester of 2018, nineteen first-year students attended a second course in Business English for advanced students. Apart from dealing with four units in *Market Leader* (Cotton, Falvey, Kent, 2011), namely *Job satisfaction*, *Risk*, *Management styles*, and *Team building*, the students were asked to choose an English-language newspaper or magazine to suit their tastes, and to read articles and topics of their particular interest. Finally, for their individual work the four major sources were chosen.

The Guardian – a British daily newspaper including latest news, breaking news and current affairs coverage from across the UK and the World, and subsections with subjects such as business, environment, technology, sport, arts, media, and lifestyle.

Forbes – an American business magazine featuring original articles on finance, industry, investing and marketing topics as well as reporting on related subjects such as technology, communications, science, politics, and law.

Newsweek – an American premier news magazine bringing high-quality journalism to readers around the globe. It provides the latest news, in-depth analysis and ideas about international issues, technology, business, culture, and politics.

The Economic Times – an English-language Indian daily newspaper. It is the world's second-most widely read English-language business newspaper and its main content is focused on the Indian economy, international finance, share prices, price of commodities as well as other matters related to finance.

On the basis of the above presented information, both quantitative and qualitative analyses will be carried out. The main aim of a quantitative analysis is to gather all texts and build a large corpus of the whole experimental group. Subsequently, a qualitative analysis identifies the topics the readers were interested in most.

Research findings and discussion

From the following research findings it is evident that the participants took this challenging task seriously. Each student was supposed to read 12 texts in order to be able to summarise them, get the main idea, and to investigate them for idioms. They worked individually, read different articles, and found lots of idioms. It can be seen that the experimental group worked with a 137,678-word corpus. Two out of nineteen students did not join the project; one of them had serious problems with English and the other was pursuing a sports career. However, there were also two other students who did not pass a standardised written examination and subsequently they did not compete this task.

The research has shown that the participants read articles from the following sources and categories: *The Guardian* – News, Opinion, Sport, Culture, and Lifestyle; *Forbes*: Billionaires, Innovation, Leadership, Money, Consumer, Industry, and Lifestyle; *Newsweek*: U.S., World, Business, Tech & Science, Culture, Sports, Health, and Opinion; *The Economic Times*: Markets, News, Industry, RISE, Politics, Wealth, MF, Tech, Jobs, Opinion, NRI, Slideshows, Panache, More, and ET Now. Of course, some categories are further subdivided.

The qualitative analysis has revealed the readers' preferences in topics. From the whole corpus, the most frequently read ones were about: management, leaders and leadership

(12x), Brexit (9x), jobs 6x, trade wars (6x), tariffs (6x), banks (6x), money (5x), Bitcoin cryptocurrency (6x), Uber (4x) and Lyft (2x) transportation companies, etc.

Although the participants were recommended to read articles closely connected with the above mentioned topics in *Market Leader*, only three articles about teams, two about insurance, and two about risk were read.

The following tables show some of the chosen participants, the headlines and word counts (W. count) of their articles.

Conclusion

As it can be seen, *Forbes* was the most popular among readers. The most frequently searched categories for the articles were: Leadership, Money, Industry, and Innovation. However, the participants working with this paper read the most difficult texts. All in all, it is believed that reading newspapers and working with articles was an inspiring way of learning English as it can learners develop not only reading skills but also writing, grammar, vocabulary, and speaking skills.

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
